Questioning Review

<u>Good questions</u> require more than yes/no answers. <u>Good questions</u>:

- Make us think and dig deeper.
- Push us to predict and infer.
- Make us notice things we hadn't before.
- Help us better understand what we've read.
- <u>Closed questions</u> are surface, one-answer-fits-all questions.
- **Open-ended questions** require readers to think; there is more than one possible answer.

Questions often begin with an **interrogative**: who, what, when, where, why, and how.

Closed Question Examples (1 answer or yes/no)	Open-Ended Question Examples (discussion; more than 1 answer)
Who is the main character?	Why do you think will be the winner?
What is the setting of the story?	What is important about the setting?
When does the story take place?	When do you think the main character will meet the villain? Why?
Where does the character go in Chapter 3?	Where do you think the main character will end up by the end of the book? Why?
Why did the main character go home in Chapter 4?	Why do you think the main character?
How did the main character get home?	How did you feel when the main character?
Did you like the story?	Why did you like or dislike the story?
